Project Overview

Tell us a little about your project. What are the main objectives of the project, and who will benefit from it?

Project Overview: This project will provide hope to children with heart disease in the Middle East. Lifesaving heart surgeries will be provided to 46 children from Jordan and from neighboring countries such as Syria, Palestine, Yemen and Iraq. Many of these children are refugees that fled their war-torn countries with a heart condition to live in camps with limited medical care.

All children will be treated at Al Khalidi Medical Center in Amman, Jordan. All children will be treated at no cost to the families. These patients rely 100% on International and local humanitarian organizations to be treated.

This Global Grant will not only heal the hearts of 46 children who would otherwise live a less than desirable life with on-going and escalating health issues or in many cases would die, but it will also provide hope to their families who never thought such a thing would be possible.

These children and their families will see that a project such as this with Rotarians and volunteers from around the world truly care and want to help. This is a project of health, a project of hope, a project of peace, a project of goodwill and a project which will sustain the lives of 46 children who otherwise have no chance at a healthy life.

Rotarian Na'el Musharbash is a member of the Amman Jerash Rotary Club and is also President of Gift of Life Amman. A Letter of Disclosure has been attached to the grant application.

Why did you choose to partner with this organization and what will its role be?

Chain of Hope UK has been working to provide cardiac care to Middle Eastern children for more than 10 years. They are considered one of the leading organizations in the field of pediatric cardiac care and their medical teams are known for their high level of expertise. Chain of Hope will provide medical teams for two medical mission weeks during the life of the grant. They will cover the cost of travel for their teams outside of grant funds. While they will share their knowledge and skills with the Jordanian team, the primary focus is to help work down the waiting list of Middle Eastern children in need of cardiac care and provide lifesaving treatment to these children who have no other alternative before it is too late.

Gift of Life - Amman (GOLA) a Non-Profit Organization which was founded by a group of Rotarians in 2006 and is dedicated to helping these children in need. To date, GOLA with the help of Rotary and other organizations such as Chain of Hope have saved the lives of more than 440 children with heart disease. GOLA has developed a partnership with Al Khalidi Medical Center and will be instrumental in helping to coordinate this project. GOLA compiles a patient list of children in need of cardiac interventions and updates this list regularly. They work together with Al Khalidi Medical Center and partner NGO's to prioritize the children for treatment. Additionally, GOLA has negotiated very reasonable rates with Al Khalidi MC for the use of their facilities (OR and ICU and General Ward). They have also negotiated that there is no cost to the families for children treated through their program. The partnership with GOLA will allow for more children to be treated under this global grant and will strengthen our relationship with Al Khalidi Medical Center. The reduced rates

afforded GOLAs are only offered during mission weeks. Therefore all children will be treated during 4 designated mission weeks - 2 weeks with the Chain of Hope medical team working with the Jordanian team and 2 weeks with the Jordanian team treating children independently.

RC Amman - Jerash created a joint committee with Gift of Life - Amman to oversee all the steps from finding the patients until the surgeries are concluded. These steps are summarized below:

- A list of cases is available at the Gift of life - Amman (GOLA) which is updated almost daily
- A Social study is performed by social consultant specialist for each case to determine eligibility falling under 'underprivileged category'
- Congenital Heart Disease cases are classified as either Urgent or Regular. Urgent cases cannot wait and need immediate intervention. Regular cases usually can wait longer.
- Following the medical and social approval, a list of patients will be presented for consideration by the medical teams.
- Arrange the necessary communications with the Hospital and the Surgeons to fix a time for the mission/surgeries to take place
- After setting the time, usually one week/mission, two operations are performed per day approximately

Project planning

Describe the community needs that your project will address.

Congenital Heart Disease CHD is the number one birth defect worldwide with 1.3 million children born annually with heart defects, 93% of them having no access to adequate healthcare. Based on these numbers, we can only estimate that the prevalence of CHD in the Middle East is overwhelming. Medical facilities in Jordan provide care to local children as well as many refugee children. For example, since March 2011, an estimated 600,000 Syrian refugees crossed the borders to Jordan, of which 52% were children. The burden of heart disease in Syrian refugee children is not known, however it constitutes a major problem for both patients and health systems of host countries. Late presentation and diagnosis, high rate of complications, suboptimal living conditions, lack of funding, shortage of specialized centers and personnel, and high mortality rates are among the major challenges facing the patient population. These patients rely 100% on International and local humanitarian organizations to be treated.

How did your project team identify these needs?

Gift of Life - Amman (GOLA) has a list of underprivileged local and refugee children with Congenital Heart Disease that need operations. This list is updated almost daily. GOLA works directly with the local healthcare facilities to determine the need as well as methods to treat the children as soon as possible. The Host club, RC Amman - Jerash is in close contact with GOLA and is very much aware of this problem.

How were members of the benefiting community involved in finding solutions?

Gift of Life - Amman (GOLA), a Non-Profit Organization, was founded by a group of Rotarians in 2006 and is dedicated to helping these children in need. To date, GOLA with the help of Rotary and other organizations such as Chain of Hope have saved more than 440 children. GOLA has formed partnerships with local healthcare facilities to allow for treatment of indigent children with heart disease at reasonable costs to the organization and no cost to the families.

How were community members involved in planning the project?

The Host Rotary Club in collaboration with GOLA have been working together for the past three years to find solutions such as fundraising and to find sponsors to support this project in a community with limited resources. Local Hospital Administrations are also working with GOLA and Rotary to provide reasonable rates on the use of facilities and cardiac supplies and medications which helps to maximize the number of children care is provide to.

Gift of Life - Amman (GOLA) a Non-Profit Organization was founded by a group of Rotarians in 2006 and is dedicated to helping these children in need. To date, GOLA with the help of Rotary and other organizations such as Chain of Hope have saved more than 440 children with heart disease.

Please describe the training, community outreach, or educational programs this project will include.

During the 2 one-week missions where the highly-qualified Chain of Hope UK healthcare professionals will join the Jordanian team to treat 10-12 Middle Eastern children (per week), they will provide skills and knowledge transfer to their counterparts on an as-needed basis. Additional mentorship is always beneficial and enhances the skills and knowledge of the local team allowing them to hone their skills in the treatment of the overwhelming list of children in need of cardiac interventions.

However, the Jordanian team is capable of and will be performing 50% of the surgeries funded through this grant independently (an additional 2 one-week missions). They are in need of the additional assistance from the Chain of Hope team to help them work down the daunting waiting list of children which continues to grow as children are born and more and more refugees seek assistance for their ill children. There simply are not enough healthcare professionals to answer the immense need for pediatric cardiac treatment. Therefore, teams like Chain of Hope are a blessing to the entire healthcare system and the families of these children in need.

Without the Jordanian doctors and nurses and healthcare volunteers like Chain of Hope, these children and

their families have no hope of treatment. This Global Grant will not only heal the hearts of 46 children who would otherwise live a less than desirable life with on-going and escalating health issues or in many cases would die, but it will also provide hope to their families who never thought such a thing would be possible...especially under the circumstances of such war-torn countries.

These children and their families will see that a project such as this with Rotarians and volunteers from around the world truly care and want to help. This is a project of health, a project of hope, a project of peace, a project of goodwill and a project which will sustain the lives of 46 children who otherwise have no chance at a healthy life.
