Project Overview

Tell us a little about your project. What are the main objectives of the project, and who will benefit from it?

This project, in memory of Rotary International President Elect Sam Owori, will empower Ugandan healthcare professionals to increase the capacity of their program and provide lifesaving cardiac care to 150 Ugandan children in 2018. A total of 30 children will receive open-heart surgery, 20 children will receive closed-heart surgery and 50 children will receive interventional catheterization procedures as a result of this grant. The Ugandan Government intends to sponsor an additional 50 surgeries at UHI.

Additionally, the project will enhance the Rheumatic Heart Disease (RHD) Outreach and Treatment Program in the Gulu District which is currently caring for over 200 children with RHD in the region. This grant will help support the addition of a low-cost telemedicine solution which will allow doctors at The Uganda Heart Institute (UHI) to provide daily remote consultation; including remote interpretation of echocardiograms performed in Gulu.

Lastly, one VTT RHD surgical mission will be funded through this grant where an additional 10 children will be treated. This training visit will focus solely on training the team at UHI in the surgical treatment of children with RHD.

Project planning

Describe the community needs that your project will address.

Approximately 500,000 babies are born in Africa with heart disease annually. Sadly, 50% die within the first few years of life without intervention. The pediatric cardiac team at UHI has greatly increased their skill level and their capacity through targeted training over the past 9 years in an effort to respond to a small portion of this monumental need. While the Ugandan Ministry of Health has provided a great deal of support to the pediatric cardiac program at UHI, additional supplemental support of supplies and medications is needed to reach more children in a timely manner. The goal of the team at UHI is to treat 150 children with heart disease in 2018 in memory of the great Sam Owori. More than 100 of these procedures will be supported through this global grant. The Ugandan Government intends to sponsor an additional 50 surgeries at UHI. Data suggests that over 130,000 school-aged children in Uganda have Rheumatic Heart Disease (RHD). At least 3 to 5 million children in all of Africa are affected by RHD. Only through the Outreach and Education program in the Gulu District are children with RHD being diagnosed and treated for the first-time ever. This program provides education to local clinics, schools and parents regarding preventative measures and treatment which was not previously offered. Additionally, the outreach program is increasing the rate of early detection of RHD making treatment a viable option for children who would have previously perished.

How did your project team identify these needs?

The statistics above illustrate the need. All partners involved are aware of this tremendous need and are eager to reach as many children as possible. Additionally, the need to increase the capacity to treat children with congenital heart disease is witnessed each and every day at the Uganda Heart Institute. While they have made huge strides in the development of their program over the past 9 years, they are still limited in the number of children they are able to help annually. Similarly, the clinical team in the Gulu District witnesses the staggering need for education and treatment of children with RHD. They too have made a tremendous impact on caring for and offering support to children with RHD. However, the need is so great that they have only begun to address this enormous crisis.

How were members of the benefiting community involved in finding solutions?

The doctors at the Uganda Heart Institute expressed a desire to Dr. Craig Sable of Children's National Hospital to help find solutions for the countless numbers of Ugandan children with RHD. These dedicated doctors requested training in the treatment of children with RHD. Additionally, they will begin to have members of their UHI team actively involved in the diagnosis and care of children with RHD in the Gulu District. With the addition of the low-cost telemedicine system in the Gulu District, the doctors at UHI will be able to have reliable communication with the team in Gulu. This will allow for children in need of intervention to be treated in a more timely manner and will improve the communication between the diagnostic team in Gulu and the surgical team in Kampala.

How were community members involved in planning the project?

The hospital administration and staff at UHI as well as the clinical staff on the ground in the Gulu District met with Dr. Craig Sable from Children's National Hospital to put together a strategy which will help address the crisis which exists for children with congenital and acquired heart disease in Uganda. Together they formed the strategies which form the basis for this project.

Please describe the training, community outreach, or educational programs this project will include.

Data suggests that over 130,000 school-aged children in Uganda have Rheumatic Heart Disease (RHD). At least 3 to 5 million children in all of Africa are affected by RHD.

1. Continued support of cardiology outpatient clinics in Gulu: The cardiology clinic in Gulu has grown significantly; they are delivering penicillin to an average of 200 children each month. They also anticipate increasing the number of children referred for valve surgery and want to be able to provide optimal support for those needing oral anticoagulation with Warfarin (including INR testing). To achieve these goals they will need to have adequate physician and nursing staffing.

2. RHD Support Group - In 2014, we studied the impact of RHD screening on child-reported health related QOL (HRQOL) in a school-based echocardiographic screening program in 386 Ugandan school children. We found that those identified with latent RHD had significantly diminished physical and emotional well-being scores despite a lack of subjective or objective clinical symptoms. Peer support groups for patients with chronic disease such as HIV/AIDS promote retention in care, improves adherence to therapy, and reduce stigma and discrimination, improve self-esteem, and enhance patients' coping skills and psychosocial functioning. In a Ugandan study, many RHD patients felt a stigma for having the health condition and being a burden to their families. There is scant information on the impact of support groups in enhancing children's experience in RHD, improving retention in care and improving quality of life. In January 2016, we launched the first pediatric support group for RHD in sub-Saharan Africa. We are studying the impact this support group has on quality of life scores as well as its reception from children and families. We have engaged local Rotarians in Gulu to assist with support group activities. The support group has been very well received, and we hope to continue this activity in the next funding year.

How were these needs identified?

Rheumatic Heart Disease (RHD) is a preventable valvular heart disease, yet millions of children are affected worldwide. Fortunately, there are low-cost ways to decrease the burden of RHD and interventions to treat more advanced valvular disease. Increased community awareness and availability of diagnosis and treatment of strep infections can lead to improved primary prevention (treating strep sore throat). Screening with

echocardiography can find cases prior to development of clinical symptoms, allowing for early initiation of secondary prophylaxis and prevention of advanced disease. Caring for children and young adults with advanced RHD in the community, including those that require anticoagulation can help improve the quality of life and long-term survival of those suffering from RHD. The partnership with the Uganda Heart Institute provides hope for increased availability of tertiary treatment of RHD at UHI with catheterization and surgery.

The doctors at the Uganda Heart Institute expressed a desire to Dr. Craig Sable of Children's National Hospital to help find solutions for the countless numbers of Ugandan children with RHD. These dedicated doctors requested training in the treatment of children with RHD. Additionally, they will begin to have members of their UHI team actively involved in the diagnosis and care of children with RHD in the Gulu District. With the addition of the low-cost telemedicine system in the Gulu District, the doctors at UHI will be able to have reliable communication with the team in Gulu. This will allow for children in need of intervention to be treated in a more timely manner and will improve the communication between the diagnostic team in Gulu and the surgical team in Kampala.

Describe the training needs that the team will address.

With the training and skills transfer provided by the VTT team, the local Ugandan healthcare professionals will continue to expand their knowledge and skills in the treatment of Ugandan children with RHD. This will help to prevent the unnecessary death of these children who have never had the opportunity to be treated in their own country and who cannot afford to travel outside their home country for treatment. The first-ever RHD surgical VTT and Cath VTT missions were conducted at UHI in 2017. This grant will provide follow up training to the 2017 mission trips and will further enhance the knowledge and skills of the Ugandan team in the treatment of children with RHD.

How did your team identify these needs?

The doctors at the Uganda Heart Institute expressed a desire to Dr. Craig Sable of Children's National Hospital to help find solutions for the countless numbers of Ugandan children with RHD. These dedicated doctors requested training in the treatment of children with RHD. Additionally, they will begin to have members of their UHI team actively involved in the diagnosis and care of children with RHD in the Gulu District. With the addition of the low-cost telemedicine system in the Gulu District, the doctors at UHI will be able to have reliable communication with the team in Gulu. Describe the specific objectives of the training, including what you expect training participants to gain from the team's expertise.

The VTT team will address the need for training and education of the local Ugandan team in the treatment and postoperative care for children with RHD. RHD is a major health concern in Uganda and while the

Ugandan healthcare professionals have made tremendous progress in the treatment of congenital heart disease, there is now a need to train them in the treatment of rheumatic heart disease. Data suggests that over 130,000 school-aged children in Uganda have Rheumatic Heart Disease (RHD). At least 3 to 5 million children in all of Africa are affected by RHD. Currently, valve repair/replacement surgery for these patients cannot be done in Uganda. The healthcare professionals at UHI have requested training in this specific area so that they may begin to learn how to treat the many children affected by RHD. This VTT mission trip will be a continuation of the skills transfer in relation to treatment of RHD which was conducted for the first-time ever in the Fall of 2017.

How were members of the local community involved in planning the training?

Nine years have been invested in its development to date and tremendous progress has been made. Hundreds of children with heart disease now have hope for the first time ever.
