Tell us a little about your project. What are the main objectives of the project, and who will benefit from it?

This project will further empower the Salvadoran Pediatric Cardiac Team to independently treat over 200 children with heart disease in their country of birth annually. This project will fund the following:

- 1) A state-of-the-art echocardiogram machine with TEE and pediatric probes (at the request of the Salvadoran pediatric cardiac team).
- 2) Supplemental disposables and medications to help ensure no lifesaving procedures are postponed due to lack of essential medical supplies.
- 3) Costs involved in conducting a Multi-Disciplinary Conference with world-class healthcare professionals facilitating a seminar for all specialties and all team members within the Salvadoran pediatric cardiac team.
- 4) Two VTT training opportunities: A) the 2019 ElectroPhysiology Mission Trip where 20 children with arrhythmias will be treated (This highly specialized procedure is not available for children in El Salvador except for during this annual mission trip) and B) a Mini Targeted Mission where 10 children with complex heart disease will be treated by the Salvadoran team but with the oversight and mentorship of a "mini" VTT Team.

Why did you choose to partner with this organization and what will its role be?

Latidos de Esperanza (LDE) has been working with Rotarians, Hospital Administrators, Government Officials and local businesses since 2010 to develop a sustainable pediatric cardiac program in El Salvador. They are highly-respected by all. LDE is well-versed in logistical planning, customs clearance, document approvals, collection of data to monitor the program, and works each day with the team from Hospital Bloom to ensure children are being treated and are receiving optimal care.

LDE has already met with the local healthcare professionals as well as the Hospital Administrators to assess the needs of the program going forward. Additionally, their role will include:

1) LDE will oversee customs clearance of all equipment and supplies purchased outside the country.

- 7) LDE will coordinate an in-country logistics for all VTT teams.
- 5) LDE will collect data for monitoring and evaluation of the project including patient information for each child treated.
- 6) LDE will process documents for approval of each VTT team member with the local authorities.
- 7) LDE will provide regular updates to all partners on the progress of the project, children treated and scheduled mission dates.
- 8) LDE will conduct a socio-economic profile for families of patients treated and evaluate whether additional assistance is needed to ensure adequate nutrition and post operative care
- 9) LDE will coordinate Nurse Training sessions as well as the Multi-Disciplinary Conference with the Salvadoran team and hospital administration.

Project planning

Describe the community needs that your project will address.

Congenital heart disease (CHD) is one of El Salvador's major health concerns. More than 1,200 children are born annually with some form of heart disease and approximately 600 of them require treatment. While some children born with less severe heart defects are able to survive for many years, their quality of life is sub-standard and lack of treatment leads to additional health issues causing a backlog in the one pediatric hospital in the entire country of 6 million people. Sadly, for those with more complex heart disease, treatment options are limited and often these children are left to suffer and ultimately perish.

While great strides have been made over the past 8 years in the development of a sustainable pediatric cardiac program, it is essential to support the Salvadoran pediatric cardiac team with the resources needed to maintain the program and their skill level as well as the increase in the number of children receiving treatment.

Specifically, this grant will provide the necessary equipment for accurately diagnosing children with heart disease with the latest technology in the Philips CX50 echocardiogram and pediatric probes. Additionally, the equipment will help to ensure positive surgical outcomes with the use of a state-of-the-art transesophageal probe.

With the addition of the new dedicated pediatric cardiac ICU in November 2017, there has been an increase in the number of patients treated. To date, the Ministry of Health and Hospital Administration are still working to increase budgets of supplies and medications to accommodate this increase. In the interim, there is a need for supplemental supplies and medications to ensure children are treated in a timely manner on a reliable basis and that surgeries are not cancelled due to a lapse in supply and medication inventory.

How did your project team identify these needs?

Latidos de Esperanza meets regularly with the local healthcare professionals as well as with the Administration of Hospital Bloom. During these strategy meetings, the need for the above mentioned equipment and supplemental supplies and meds was requested. These needs were then shared with local Rotarians who have been supporting and working towards a sustainable pediatric cardiac program at Hospital Bloom for several years.

How were members of the benefiting community involved in finding solutions?

The cardiologists and surgeons at Hospital Bloom were consulted in regards to specific needs, models, specs and how this would benefit their program based on their request for support.

How were community members involved in planning the project?

The project was planned as a result of information collected from local healthcare professionals and hospital administrators. This information was then used to create a strategy to ensure children with heart disease are treated in their country of birth as early in life as possible and on a reliable basis. A strategic meeting was held between Latidos de Esperanza and local Rotarians to draft an outline for a Rotary Global Grant.

Project implementation

Describe the training needs that the team will address.

Training during the Electrophysiology VTT mission will be specifically targeted on the treatment of children with arrhythmias. This will include training session on proper diagnosis, hands-on training in the cath lab as well as classroom training for cardiologists and residents interested in learning these highly specialized techniques. Lastly, training will be provided to children and their parents who live with arrhythmias and how to cope.

Additionally, with the new ICU providing care to cardiac patients on a regular basis, the Salvadoran team as well as the hospital administration feel that they would greatly benefit from a Multi-Disciplinary Training Conference similar to one which was facilitated by Gift of Life International in 2010 when the program was in its infant stages. This conference would focus on protocols, team cohesiveness, communication and humanized care in relation to the treatment of all levels of complexity for pediatric cardiac patients.

How did your team identify these needs?

The surgical and post-op team have become proficient in the treatment of lower complexity heart defects. However, they have requested additional training to enhance their knowledge and skills in the treatment of children with complex heart disease who they are still unable to help independently.

There is no treatment for children with arrhythmias in El Salvador. Each year when the team from UCLA returns there is a long list of children praying that they will be chosen for treatment since there is no other option. Local cardiologists have expressed interest in learning how to perform these highly specialized procedures.

The Salvadoran team is always striving to improve their program and their skills. They have requested the Multi-disciplinary conference in an effort to maximize their impact for Salvadoran children with heart disease and to revisit and reinforce protocols and team cohesiveness which are essential components of any highly respected pediatric cardiac program.

Describe the specific objectives of the training, including what you expect training participants to gain from the team's expertise.

Dr. Richard Ohye, pediatric cardiac surgeon and Dr. Gabe Owens, pediatric cardiologist are some of the most highly-qualified and skilled doctors in the field of pediatric complex heart disease. Both currently practice at the C.S. Mott Children's Hospital / University of Michigan which is ranked in the top three pediatric cardiac programs in the United States. The Salvadoran team has specifically requested training from this team. They have developed a rapport over the years of mentorship and consider this team to be excellent teachers. The training participants will increase their knowledge and skills specifically in the treatment of children with complex heart disease. Currently, the Salvadoran team is not well-versed in treating these children and often must turn them away or if operated experience negative outcomes. The expectation is to further improve knowledge and skills through observation, didactic and clinical training of these complex patients.

For the EP mission, objectives are to further expose local cardiologists to the highly specialize procedures and begin to have them participate in the treatment. There will also be classroom sessions offered for both physicians and parents to provide additional education.

The multi-disciplinary conference will focus on protocols, team cohesiveness, communication and humanized care. VTT Team members will provide the training and knowledge to the Salvadoran team.

How were members of the local community involved in planning the training?

The local doctors and nurses have specifically request training in complex heart disease and also specifically requested training from Dr. Ohye and Dr. Owens and their team.

Local healthcare professionals, together with Latidos de Esperanza, hospital administrators and Rotarians were involved in the strategy to plan this training.
