Project Overview

Tell us a little about your project. What are the main objectives of the project, and who will benefit from it?

This project will provide hope to children with heart disease in the Middle East. Lifesaving heart surgeries will be provided to 25 Lebanese children who will be operated by the local pediatric cardiac team at the American University of Beirut Medical Center (AUBMC). A total of 22 Refugee children from Syria and other Middle Eastern Countries will be operated at Hammoud Hospital in Saida. Eight of these children will be operated during a Training Mission where the local team will receive targeted one-on-one training from the visiting healthcare professionals from Riley Children’s Hospital. The other 14 children will be operated by the local team, independent of a training team. Overall, this global grant will provide hope and a chance for a healthy future to 47 Middle Eastern children and their families as well as provide skills transfer to the local healthcare professionals at Hammoud Hospital.

Why did you choose to partner with this organization and what will its role be?

Gift of Life Lebanon has developed a relationship with both AUBMC and Hammoud Hospital which will allow for the beneficiaries of this global grant to be operated. Gift of Life Lebanon has worked to obtain a commitment from each hospital to operate Lebanese and Syrian Refugee children in need at a greatly reduced rate.

Gift of Life Lebanon responsibilities include:

- 1) Work together with Host Rotarians and with each hospital to ensure all children are selected, operated, recovered and receive post-operative follow-up care.
- 2) Work together with each hospital to schedule surgeries for each patient and follow up with them to collect patient data for monitoring and evaluation of the project
- 3) Obtain and report all patient data for patients treated by the local team at both AUBMC and Hammoud Hospital, including before and after photos, to partners to keep them up to date on the project's progress. This information to be distributed after each 10 patients treated.
- 4) Obtain signed photo release forms from each child's parent or guardian.
- 5) Coordinate the submittal of invoices from each hospital to the Rotary Club of Sahel Metn for review and payment.
- 6) Coordinate all in-country non-medical logistics for the VTT Team including accommodations, transportation and food.
- 7) Coordinate logistics of VTT mission with Hammoud Hospital including dates, availability of local team for training, availability of narcotics and basic disposables.
- 8) Obtain and report all patient data for patients treated during the VTT mission to Hammoud Hospital, including before and after photos, to partners to keep them up to date on the project's progress. This information to be distributed within one week of the mission.
- 9) Submit documents for Project Management to the Rotary Club of Medford-Vincetown for review, approval and payment.

American University of Beirut Medical Center (AUBMC) has been partnering with Gift of Life Lebanon for more than 4 years and has been providing treatment for children with heart disease at greatly reduced rates. AUBMC provides excellent care for these children and has been a partner on 4 previous Rotary Global Grants. It is only through their partnership that more than 200 Middle Eastern children have received treatment for their heart ailments in partnership with Gift of Life Lebanon over the past 4 years. AUBMC will provide treatment for 25 Lebanese children who otherwise would not be able to receive care.

Hammoud Hospital University Medical Center is a government hospital who has also partnered with Gift of Life Lebanon specifically to provide treatment for refugee children with heart disease. Again, through this

partnership, children are treated at greatly reduced rates. Hammoud Hospital will provide treatment for 21 refugee children. 8 of these children will be treated during the VTT training mission planned for Fall 2020. During this VTT mission, Hammoud healthcare professionals will participate in the training to enhance their knowledge and skills in the treatment and post-operative care of pediatric cardiac patients.

Host Rotarians will work together with Gift of Life Lebanon to ensure the children for the project are selected, operated, recovered and receive post-operative follow-up care. They will contribute funds to the project to help complete funding. Host Rotarians will report to all contributing global grant partners on the progress of the project on a regular basis. Host Rotarians will manage grant funds for all payments to AUBMC and Hammoud Hospitals. They will provide all invoices and bank statements to the International Partner for reporting purposes. Host Rotarians will provide hospitality to the VTT team members and any visiting Rotarians and will make the necessary arrangements for food and accommodations for them.

Describe the role that international Rotarians will have in this project.

International Rotarians will contribute funds to the project to help complete funding. They will administer the grant and create interim and final reports per Rotary requirements. International Rotarians will manage grant funds for all expenses related to the VTT Team and the Project Management Fee. They will collect all data for monitoring and evaluation of the project from Gift of Life Lebanon and report to The Rotary Foundation. International Rotarians will publicize the project within their club and district to raise awareness of Rotary's impact in the lives of these children and their families. International Rotarians will assist with travel arrangements for the VTT team and help to ensure they have all necessary documents in order.

Project planning

Describe the community needs that your project will address.

There are currently more than 100 Lebanese children on the waiting list for heart surgery with the majority of these cases at AUBMC. Sadly, there is a lack of funding available causing surgeries to be put on hold which results in children dying before they receive treatment. It is unclear as to how many refugee children are suffering from heart disease in Middle Eastern countries. However, based on the data that congenital heart disease is the number one birth defect worldwide with 1.3 million children born annually with a heart defect and 93% of them having no access to adequate care, we can only estimate that the numbers are shocking. Additionally, providing care to Syrian Refugee children will not only heal their hearts but demonstrate a message of peace and love which is currently lacking in their lives and the lives of their families. Additionally, with the current political climate in Lebanon, local funding sources have either pulled back funding or reallocated funds to directly help those affected by the unrest. This has created an even larger need for children with heart disease since funding previously allocated for care has been re-directed leaving these children without lifesaving treatment.

How did your project team identify these needs?

As in most developing countries, resources available to respond to the tremendous need for pediatric cardiac care do not come close to adequately addressing the crisis. Since the current healthcare system cannot meet the need for care of Lebanese and refugee children with heart disease, the pediatric cardiac waiting list continues to grow. Gift of Life Lebanon has been working together with AUBMC and Hammoud Hospital as well as with local Rotarians since their inception in 2015 to treat as many of these children as possible. The families of the children this project will treat do not have funding to pay for such a complex surgery and therefore would never have a chance of their child being treated. This project also demonstrates world peace through the treatment of refugee children who otherwise have no hope of survival. These children and their families already face daily struggles that others would not face. They have been displaced from their homes and are fighting for their survival. A simple act of kindness to those who have the additional stress of having a child with heart disease in these less than desirable conditions will show them that there are people in the world who care about them and love them.

How were members of the benefiting community involved in finding solutions?

AUBMC, Hammoud Hospital and the Ministry of Health are all aware of the great need to provide care for children with heart disease in a timely manner. With limited resources available locally, these healthcare partners welcome the partnership with Gift of Life Lebanon and Rotary to help treat these children before they have waited so long that they become untreatable and ultimately perish. These healthcare facilities will provide their facility and staff as well as supplies and medications needed to treat these children at greatly reduce rates.

How were community members involved in planning the project?

Representatives from Gift of Life Lebanon, AUBMC, Hammoud Hospital and local Rotary Clubs have all been involved in the planning of the project to help address the need for pediatric cardiac care for Middle Eastern children. These partners have collaborated to agree upon a reasonable price for the surgeries, pre-op and post-operative care as well as the responsibilities of each partner. These partners have collaborated to respond to the immense need for pediatric cardiac care for Middle Eastern children since 2015 and are providing hope and a second chance at life to both Lebanese and Refugee children who have no other resources for treatment.

Describe the training needs that the team will address.

The healthcare professionals at Hammoud Hospital are proficient in performing low complexity heart surgeries, however, they are in need of training to perform the more complex procedures. At this time, they are unable to provide care to children with more complex heart disease. Therefore, these children are left to perish. Training will focus on the more complex procedures while reviewing protocols for the lower complexity procedures as well.

How did your team identify these needs?

A request for training in complex cardiac surgery procedures and post-operative care was requested by the healthcare professionals at Hammoud Hospital. They have expressed a desire to increase the capacity of their program in an effort to provide care to more children in need. Additionally, they are motivated to enhance their knowledge and skills to help children with more complex heart disease.

Describe the specific objectives of the training, including what you expect training participants to gain from the team's expertise.

The VTT team will focus specifically on:

- 1) Evaluating the skill level of the pediatric cardiac team at Hammoud Hospital
- 2) Providing targeted training to each specialty within the pediatric cardiac program based on the assessed skill level
- 3) Diagnosis, treatment and post-operative care of children with heart disease of a more complex nature than are currently being treated

Training participants will increase their knowledge and skill, within their specialty, in the treatment of children with complex heart disease.

How were members of the local community involved in planning the training?

As mentioned above, a request for training in more complex pediatric cardiac procedures was requested by Hammoud Hospital. Local Rotarians and Gift of Life Lebanon responded to this request for help which, in turn, will provide lifesaving treatment to more Middle Eastern children in need.

The partnership between Gift of Life Lebanon, Hammoud Hospital, the Lebanese Ministry of Health and local Rotarians has been formed to ensure the continuity of services and training to help heal the hearts of as many children as possible.

Gift of Life Lebanon has formed a partnership with the Lebanese Ministry of Health and AUBMC which has allowed for the cost of these lifesaving heart surgeries to be reduced from more than \$30,000 each to just \$5,000 each for Lebanese children. They have also formed a partnership with Hammoud Hospital who has further reduced their cost to \$3,000 each for Refugee children operated by their local team and \$4,000 per refugee child operated during the VTT. The slightly higher cost for surgeries during the VTT is a result of more complex cases being completed which require additional medications and supplies.
