These children will be screened and selected from the most impoverished areas of Egypt where there is currently no care available to them. All surgeries will be performed by Rotarian and Pediatric Cardiac Surgeon, Dr. Hesham Shawky and Dr. Tarek Salah, Pediatric Cardiac Surgeon and the Assisting team.

Project planning

Describe the community needs that your project will address.

In Egypt, the rate of patients diagnosed with congenital heart disease is approximately 8/1000 living births. This translates to 15,000 - 16,000 babies born annually with a congenital heart defect and 50% or 8,000 of them needing corrective heart surgery within their first year of life. The current healthcare system in Egypt is only able to provide care to half of these children, leaving the other 4,000 children to ultimately perish. There are many cities and areas in Egypt where there is no access to pediatric cardiac care. These areas are among the poorest in the country. Families with children in need of help in these areas have no resources available to them and live with no hope of treatment for their child. Egyptian cardiac surgeons and cardiologists will reach out to children in the above mentioned areas who lack access to medical care as well as to children in need in the Cairo area. Egyptian doctors will screen, diagnose and select 53 children for treatment at Cairo University Hospital. Children selected will undergo their lifesaving open heart surgeries in Cairo and will be able to resume their lives as normal children who are able to play and grow up to be normal adults.

How did your project team identify these needs?

The National Insurance Committee for Congenital Heart Disease conducted research to identify the needs which this project should address. Dr. Shawky coordinates with this committee & accordingly the selection of

patients is done. Additionally, during the screening and selection of patients through the previous global grant, it became even more apparent how extensive the need was. Many parents in these impoverished areas have children in need of treatment but are unaware of the options available to them or they do not have the means to travel to Cairo for treatment.

How were members of the benefiting community involved in finding solutions?

Local Rotarians and local healthcare professionals researched the need for children in Egypt with heart disease and designed a proposal on how to address these needs and provide them with hope for a healthy future. Rotarians helped to provide transportation to children and their parents during the previous global grant and will do so again to help ensure they receive the lifesaving treatment they so desperately need.

How were community members involved in planning the project?

Dr. Shawky and local Rotarians worked together with local healthcare professionals and the hospital administration to research and plan the strategy on how to best implement the project.

8.
